




This Half term, we have marked the Feasts of the Epiphany, The Baptism of the Lord, and the Presentation of the Lord through Bible Reflections and Mass.

On Wednesday 31st January 2024 the stage curtain of Aquinas Hall rose to reveal a moonlit graveyard. Enter the Addams family and their ensemble of family ancestors and the first performance of The Addams Family Musical at St John Payne had begun! The cast of 70 students consisted of 64 performers, 3 backstage crew and 3 make-up artists from Year 7 to Year 13, a real 'whole school production'. The 2-hour comedy musical tells the story of Wednesday Addams, known for her love of darkness, and how she has fallen in love with a sweet man from a seemingly respectable and ordinary family. As Wednesday falls in love, family members begin to find out, forcing Gomez, her father, to keep a secret from his love, Morticia.

The amazing cast performed 5 shows in 3 days to over 1,000 audience members. This included 2 morning performances to hundreds of local primary school children and a 3rd morning performance to the whole student cohort of our neighbour school Columbus where some students were experiencing live theatre for the first time. Both evening performances were a sellout making us consider putting on a 3rd evening performance next year!

Literacy & Library News






For the entire month of February, St.

PASTORAL CARE, MENTAL HEALTH & WELLBEING

HCRG Care Group deliver a 'Family Hub' service in partnership with Barnardo's across Essex. It is named locally as the Essex Child and Family Wellbeing Service (ECFWS) and it is commissioned by Essex County Council (ECC).

The services provided by the Essex Child and Family Wellbeing Service began on 01 April 2017.

Pre-Birth to 19 Years (up to 25 for those with SEND)

A large part of the ECFWS service that we operate includes the delivery of integrated child and family services across Essex for pre-birth to 19 years (PB19)

These are made up of services historically referred to as:

0-5 Healthy Child Programme
Healthy Schools Programme
5-19 Healthy Child Programme
Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) support up to 25 years
Children in Care

Management of Family Hubs and satellite Healthy Family Delivery Sites (previously known as Children's Centres).

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ONLINE BULLYING

Supporting young people who have experienced bullying online.

Cyberbullying, or online bullying, is when someone uses the internet to bully someone else. The Cambridge dictionary defines cyberbullying as 'Someone who uses the internet to harm or frighten another person, especially by sending them unpleasant messages.'

Best practices for Have an open conversation Listen, and offer support and encouragement. If your child is the parents and carers victim of cyberbullying, remind them that this is not their fault and that no one deserves to be treated in this way. Some young people think that if they are the target of online bullying, they must have done something wrong. It is also important to encourage your child to save the evidence. They can do this by taking a screenshot of what has happened or by keeping the messages they have received. Most of the time the person doing the bullying is looking for a reaction when they are being mean online. Tell your child not to reply, instead they should tell a trusted adult what has happened. Reassure them that even if they are also at fault, they should come and talk to you or a trusted adult. You can then work out the best way to resolve the situation together.

Don't deny access to technology

Although it can be very tempting to remove a device from a young person if they are being bullied, having their device taken away may prevent them from speaking to you about worrying issues in the future.
