

Year 11 students recently attended our sixth form subject fair, with Key Stage 5 students presenting to their younger peers to inform their post-16 choices, whilst parents of Year 9 students joined our online presentation to help inform students' Key Stage 4 options.



We look forward to sharing their journey with you.












# NEW STAFF INTRODUCTIONS




### **SJP Whole School Musical 2025**



#### Matilda's Magic Melts January Blues at St John Payne

A school hall can be a space filled with mixed memories, but St John Payne's production of Matilda the Musical Jr. transformed a potentially mundane setting into a vibrant hub of energy and excitement. The cast, brimming with talent and enthusiasm, ignited the hall with infectious laughter and dynamic performances. From the opening number, the audience was swept up in a whirlwind of sound and movement, a testament to the stunning ensemble work.

The junior version of Matilda presents unique challenges, with key narrative elements often condensed. Director and choreographer, Miss Nowlan, masterfully navigated these transitions, creating potent moments of comedy and ensuring a smooth flow. Cambridge University Outreach Opportunity, designed to raise student aspiration for top universities in an inspiring effort to help students aim higher and navigate the application process for top universities, an outreach opportunity was recently held to raise aspirations and provide crucial tools for success.

A group of Year 12 students had the opportunity to attend this event, designed to guide students through the intricate journey of university applications, focused particularly on crafting compelling personal statements and how to prepare for university interviews — essential components of many competitive university admissions.

The day-long workshop was hosted by the University of Cambridge, Emmanuel College. The day's activities were structured to ensure that students not only learned about how the university applications system works but so they also left feeling empowered, confident, and motivated to pursue their dreams of attending top-tier universities.

"After today, I have gained a greater insight into what the ingredients are for a competitive application for Oxbridge. We were informed about the importance of super-curriculars, especially wider reading. So, from this, I am going to deepen my knowledge on socio-political subjects, such as reading "A Room of One's Own" By Virginia Woolf, to not only aid my interview, but also for my own personal fulfilment".

"Visiting Cambridge today instilled the motivation in me, to progress through year 12 and 13 with grades that enable me to go to any university and not be held back".

"Overall, I found this trip to be very educational and gave me a deeper insight into what is required for the transition from sixth form to university".

"I learnt that the financial aspect of university shouldn't put me off where I want to go, and that the media make student loans seem an issue than it actually is not".

"From the trip, I got the opportunity to admire the gorgeous architecture of the buildings and appreciate the beauty of the library in addition to learning about the new format of the personal statement".

"Yesterdays trip helped me build a greater understanding of the university process especially with Russel group universities. It helped me to understand the new personal statement setup, what is required in a good personal statement and the interview process of specific universities. I found it incredibly beneficial and has showed me what i need to be doing to get into a good university".

Now that the UCAS applications have been submitted, our next focus will be supporting students in selecting their firm and insurance choices, which are crucial decisions to make in the coming weeks. #### Apprenticeships - An Alternative to University

## Did you know?





University is not the right pathway for every child, but sometimes it takes courage to choose an alternative route. You may have heard a great deal about apprenticeships, but are not convinced they are a viable alternative for your young one. Doing your homework may change your mind.

#### What is an apprenticeship?

It is a real job where you learn as you earn, often at a college, university or with a training provider. You can start from the age of 16, but there are no age limits. It can take one to six years to complete, depending on the apprenticeship. There are hundreds of different apprenticeships across a wide range of industries.



## What can you do?

#### Deciding what to do

Before embarking on an apprenticeship, it is worth taking the time to talk to your young person about what interests them. Going to events such as WorldSkillsUK and Big Bang Fairs can open their eyes to a whole world of careers and jobs they may not even know exists. Getting inspired and being passionate is the key to success. You don't know what you don't know.

For many young people, going to university just does not appeal. Rather than falling in step, investigate what the options are. If it is inspiration you need, CareerMap publishes CareerMag with plenty of quality independent information about different careers and qualifications, dispelling many myths that exist.

And if wearing a cap and gown is important, consider a Degree Apprenticeship. A Degree Apprenticeship offers training on the job whilst gaining a full diploma, but without the debt. Once the apprenticeship is completed, most get a job straight away with their employers. Imagine competing for a job with up to six years' work experience with a degree and no debt! It will make your young person very employable in a competitive market.

#### How do I find an apprenticeship opportunity?

The Government has set up the Register of Apprenticeship Training Providers to ensure universities, colleges and learning providers provide quality apprenticeship training. The full list of available apprenticeships available near you can be found at www.findapprenticeship.service.gov.uk. You can either apply for Degree Apprenticeships on the UCAS website or direct with an employer or learning provider.

However, many parents and carers feel they would like much more information before applying straight away. Have a look at www.careermap.co.uk for live apprenticeship vacancies with plenty of information to help make the right decision.

Careers are no longer a linear path. Our young people will typically have five or more careers in a lifetime. Whichever path your young person takes, the more experience and skills they gain along the way, the more successful future they will have.



Millennials are likely to have **TWELVE** jobs in their working lives. Jane Warren, CEO of Investec Click and Investec, said, "The days of having a job for life have long been over and our findings show that younger people are keen to take control of their careers by switching jobs to meet their objectives, despite the greater insecurity this brings."

The career path that our young people take at 18 may be the first of many.



## What can you do?

Deciding what you want to do or be in the future can be very daunting for young people, and also a milestone for you as you watch your child starting to think about becoming much more independent.

- It is important that you ask them to consider what they really like, and the things that they could do – they shouldn't rule anything out at this stage.
- Encourage them to do research. They can look at career videos and consider the facts and figures or careers they may be interested in.
- They could look at the range of apprenticeships that are available and where they can lead – they are a completely viable alternative to a traditional university route.

- Ask them if they are going to do work experience so they can gain more understanding of a potential career, or to help in the development of soft skills that will enhance their applications. You may have friends who are happy to have your son/daughter shadowing them for a couple of days in their holidays.
- Perhaps they could consider some volunteering opportunities that will serve to add to their experience, develop their soft skills and enhance their CVs.

#### **Christmas Reading Competition Winner Announced!**








### **We Remember**

And to teach world leaders to never again be led astray, This Holocaust Day, we remember, we mourn, we pray.






