Year 7 enjoyed their Community Mass in October with parents, staff and Governors. Fr Damien came to celebrate this with us and it was a lovely occasion.







Navigating UCAS: Next Steps for Year 13

As our Year 13 students approach the final stages of their sixth form journey, the UCAS (Universities and Colleges Admissions Service) process is in full swing. With eight early entry applications already submitted for competitive courses like medicine, dentistry, and prestigious institutions such as Oxford and Cambridge, we are excited to see the commitment and dedication our students are showcasing. Our goal is to ensure that all remaining applications are submitted by Christmas.

Understanding UCAS

UCAS is the platform that facilitates university applications in the UK. It allows students to apply to multiple universities simultaneously, streamlining the process. For many Year 13 students, this represents a pivotal moment, as they take their next steps toward higher education and future careers. The Importance of Early applications for certain courses are crucial due to the highly competitive nature of these fields. Universities often receive a large volume of applications, and those who apply early can benefit from early offers. Additionally, submitting applications ahead of the general deadline allows students to focus on their A-level studies without the added pressure of pending deadlines and mock exams in January. Preparing for the Next Steps as we aim to submit the remaining applications by Christmas, it's essential for students to stay organised and focused. Here are some key steps to ensure a successful application process.

Personal Statements: Crafting a compelling personal statement is vital

This is the student's opportunity to display their passion for their chosen field and demonstrate why they would be an excellent candidate. Students are advised to seek feedback from their tutors to refine their statement.

Research Universities

Students are encouraged to thoroughly research the universities and courses they are interested in. Understanding what each institution offers and aligning it with personal goals can help tailor applications more effectively.

Support and Resources

We encourage students and parents to reach out for support throughout this process. Our school offers guidance and resources to assist with personal statements and the whole UCAS process.

The journey through UCAS is both exciting and challenging, but with the right preparation and support, our Year 13 students can navigate it successfully. The future is bright, and we are proud to support our students every step of the way!

Using Flashcards

Did you know?




Using flashcards is a repetition strategy. They are a simple 'cue' on the front and an 'answer' on the back. Flashcards engage students in "active recall", which means they are creating connections with their memory.

Research shows that using flashcards can enhance long-term learning and help students to memorise facts quickly. Flashcards are not an effective method for last-minute cramming!

Studies have found that it's more effective to review a whole stack of cards in one sitting rather than to carry them around and have students glance at them every so often.

What can you do?




Try testing your child using the flashcards and give them time to digest the question before answering. If they get the answer right, don't discard the card – they need to keep repeating it again and over time.

When using the flashcards, help your child review their cards using a system. With your child, read





Did you know?



There is a school of thought that Year 11 to Year 12 is one of the hardest transitions for students to make. Students have to deal with a new way of working, learning and organisation - so it is really important that the transition into Y12, and the subsequent learning that takes place, is as good as it can be.



What can you do?

- One key difference between Year 11 and Year 12 is that students will have study periods, and these will need to be used wisely. Those of you familiar with Harry Potter will recollect that Hermione had it nailed: "As Hermione had predicted, the sixth year's free periods were not the hours of blissful relaxation Ron had anticipated, but times in which to attempt to keep up with the vast amount of homework they were being set. Not only were they studying as though they had exams every day, but the lessons themselves had become more demanding than ever before."
- One of the very important things is supporting students to deal with beginning a new course – and what happens when they get their first piece of work back. Usually, this will not be the type of

- grade that they were used to receiving by the end of Year 11. We are not expecting that students will achieve their end targets from September of Year 12.
- It is important to encourage your child to get into helpful routines as Year 12/13 is about them being independent and responsible. If they are given a homework diary then they should record what they need to do in there and when it is due. They need to plan out their time properly.
- To motivate them, it is often helpful if they gather some ideas of what they might do after their KS5 is over. There are so many options available for students post-18 and it is good for them to look at some of the options right at the start.

E-SAFETY



Group chats are places where you can talk to more than one person at the same time. You can do this on dedicated apps, messaging apps, social media platforms or online games.

Some people create group chats for close friends. But other groups have hundreds or even thousands of people in. These can be people from the same school or area, or people from across the world.

Creating positive group spaces

Group chats can be positive spaces if:

You support and respect each other.

Real friends are kind and support each other through difficult times. They don't make jokes which might embarrass another person.

You call out rude comments. If you feel comfortable to, challenge anyone making rude comments or jokes about people you know. They will be less likely to say horrible things again if they know others don't agree with them.

You ask before you share information about people you know. Don't share personal information about friends in group chats with other people. This could hurt and humiliate them.

Tips for safer group spaces

- 1 Speak to an adult if nasty messages are being sent. It doesn't matter if the messages are about you or someone else you don't need to deal with it alone. Teachers are responsible for supporting students who are being bullied or embarrassed online, even if it's happening outside of school or college hours. You could also speak to a family member or contact a support service.
- Avoid group chats with lots of people you don't know. Joining group chats with people you don't know could put you in uncomfortable situations. People you don't know could send inappropriate content, or they might pressure you to do things you don't want to do. If you're ever put under pressure online it's never your fault and you can get help.
- Check your privacy settings. See if you can change the settings on your app to make sure that only contacts, friends or followers can add you into group chats. This means you'll be less likely to receive inappropriate content and things you don't want to see.
- 4 Leave the group if you don't feel comfortable. Don't laugh along with something that's upsetting or embarrassing, either to you or someone else. Even adding an emoji or commenting on what's said could encourage more mean comments. Leaving the chat will show you don't agree with that behaviour.
- Remember that it's difficult to delete comments and photos that have been shared with groups. Once the messages have been read by recipients, it's difficult to take them back. Make sure you think about what you share with large groups of people. Keep your messages kind and respectful.
